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

**1993** On April 30th, four years after publishing a proposal for "an idea of linked information systems," computer scientist Tim Berners-Lee released the source code for the world's first web browser and editor. Originally called Mesh, the browser that he dubbed "World Wide Web" became the first royalty free, easy to use means of browsing the emerging information network that developed into the internet as we know it today. Simple Web browsers like Mosaic appeared a short time later, and before long the Web had become by far the most popular system of its kind. Within a matter of years, Berners-Lee's invention had revolutionized information-sharing and, in doing so, had dramatically altered the way that human beings communicated.
